#### Pasture for Life visit to Scilly

Pasture for Life is working with us to develop a grazing plan that supports both conservation grazing on Wildlife Trust land and regenerative grazing on farms.

A big thank you to all the land managers and farmers who took the time to meet with Dan Smith and Alex Crawley from Pasture for Life, during their visit to Scilly last month. They are currently reviewing your survey responses and feedback. For those who have not yet spoken to them about conservation grazing, we will update you with their next visit dates as soon as possible.

Their expertise will help:

- ✓ Improve soil health and biodiversity by promoting regenerative grazing methods.
- ✓ Support farmers in finishing livestock on grass with minimal supplementary feeding.
- ✓ Develop site-specific strategies for managing cattle, goats, and ponies key species in conservation grazing that help control invasive plants and maintain habitats like heathlands and maritime grasslands.

### Abattoir Update

Plans for a mobile abattoir for the islands took another step forward this month when designer, Andy Gray returned to St Mary's to visit the proposed site.

Andy is a Devon based farmer and butcher and has been a vocal advocate for the importance of local slaughtering facilities. He is on the Abattoir Sector Group and is a pivotal figure in promoting access to small scale abattoirs that support high animal welfare.

As well as visiting on of the possible sites at Parting Carn on St Mary's, he met potential slaughtermen, local planners and the Duchy of Cornwall to discuss the design.

Last year, the Isles of Scilly Farmers and Growers Initiative took a group from across the islands to Andy's beef and deer farm, Elston Farm. They also went to the Cotswolds to visit the country's only mobile abattoir and to visit local slaughterman, Viv George.

Andy's visit underscores the critical need for a local abattoir, reducing transportation expenses, improving animal welfare and increasing the amount of local meat available on the islands.

Scilly's abattoir plans align with broader efforts across the UK to bring back small scale abattoirs. Andy Gray's involvement brings valuable insights into sustainable abattoir design, planning and operation. The plans will be available for islanders to see soon.

# Isles of Scilly farmers explore sustainable farming in the Tamar Valley

Issy Tibbs, from the Farmers and Growers Initiative tells us about the visit last month.

Farmers from across the islands embarked on an information gathering trip to the Tamar Valley in Cornwall. The three day event was organised by the Isles of Scilly Farmers and Growers Initiative, a project aimed at engaging and supporting Scilly farmers.

The visit, funded by FiPL, explored innovative farming practices and strengthened connections with the mainland. It began with a visit to Tamar Grow Local Farm Start Up at Lower Metherell. Rachael Forster, from the project, showed farmers around the various plots growing harvests such as lavender, flax and vegetables. Tenants are able to have a go at running small farm businesses with the hope they gain experience to start their own farms in the future.

At Bohetherick Farm near St Dominic, Jess and Will Jean showed the group around their National Trust tenancy, where they farm North Devon cattle. They have also diversified into alpaca walking. At Strawberry Fields Farm Shop at Lifton, Adam Mounce enthusiastically showcased his family's successful farm-to-fork business, including a tour of their tulip fields as part of their Tulip Festival plans. (It included seeing the Dutch windmill being constructed!). The itinerary also included Duchy College, where the farmers explored the work they are doing there

to be more sustainable.

On the final day, everyone headed back to West Cornwall to visit Trink Farm near Hayle, who were inspired by a visit to Troytown Farm on St Agnes to expand their dairy.

The group recognised that there is a lot happening in the environmental space right now - new strategies, new advice, and both new and ongoing initiatives to absorb. We concluded that a key priority is streamlining and simplifying land management for Scilly. It also reminded us just how resilient we are as a community and how aligned we all are in our goals for protecting our farm businesses and biodiversity.
